Collaboration Builds Strength

Looking ahead to 2025, it's clear that collaboration is the cornerstone of our success at The Cathedral Center. Our collective commitment to supporting individuals and families facing homelessness continues to grow stronger, and together with our community partners, supporters, and donors, we are making meaningful strides in addressing this critical issue.

In December 2024, the highly anticipated Point in Time data for January 2024 was released, showing a continued reduction in the number of people experiencing literal homelessness in Milwaukee. While this progress is encouraging, the reports also revealed that we still have much work ahead of us. Just before Christmas, street outreach teams and warming shelters reported over 180 individuals sleeping outside, a stark reminder of the urgency of our mission. As of January 2025, providers in warming and shelter networks have voiced concerns about the capacity of the system. The warming room system, which serves as a vital resource for those facing extreme cold, is stretched beyond its limits and is set to close at the end of the month, leaving many without the emergency shelter they so desperately need.

This is where collaboration becomes essential. The challenges we face are not insurmountable when we work togetherwhen local providers, community leaders,

and compassionate supporters come together, we can continue to provide vital services and resources. One shining example of this spirit of collaboration is the story of a single mother at our emergency shelter. With the help of individual donors, we were able to provide her with a new stroller and car seats for her premature twins, allowing her to care for them as she works to regain stability. It's small acts of kindness like these, combined with the larger efforts of our community, that make a tangible difference in the lives of those we serve.

This past year, we also celebrated a significant milestone with the success of our 10th Annual Empowerment Challenge.



Thanks to the generosity of our community, we not only met but exceeded our fundraising goal by raising \$53,806. This success is instrumental in stabilizing the

flexible funding needed to support our guests facing homelessness and housing crises as they navigate unique barriers on their journey to stability. We are deeply grateful for the support of our \$25,000 match pool donors, Peter Geisert and the William N. and Janice V. Godfrey Family Foundation. Their generosity helped propel us beyond our goal. We also want to express our gratitude to Radio Milwaukee for running Empowerment Challenge PSAs during their air time, helping to raise awareness and spread the message of empowerment

As we look toward 2025, we are reminded of the strength that comes from working together. The road ahead may be challenging, but with continued collaboration between donors, service providers, and supporters—we can build a stronger, more resilient community for those experiencing homelessness. The progress we've made thus far is just the beginning, and we know that by staying committed to our shared vision, we will continue to make a lasting impact.

Moving Beyond Homelessness



Emergency Shelter

In 2024, Cathedral Center was honored to provide 16,395 nights of shelter to 238 women and 205 individuals across 65 families, each facing their own struggles and uncertainties. For many, our shelter was not just a roof over their heads—it was a safe haven where they could begin to rebuild their lives, free from the trauma of homelessness and crisis. Our compassionate team of Case Managers worked hand-inhand with each client, offering personalized guidance and unwavering support. Together, they created Individualized Plans for Independence, setting goals to secure safe housing, increase income, and improve overall well-being. With the encouragement and resources they needed, clients began to see a path forward, one step at a time. By the end of the year, 105 women and 35 families had successfully exited the shelter, moving into stable homes and new beginnings. These outcomes represent more than just numbers—they are stories of resilience, courage, and hope. They are lives transformed, families reunited, and futures rebuilt, all thanks to the strength of the individuals we serve and the unwavering support of our dedicated staff. We are proud to stand beside them as they take these lifechanging steps toward a brighter, more stable future.

Community Case Management

We are deeply moved to share the story of Jessica, a courageous mother of three who fled an abusive relationship and a painful divorce, leaving behind everything



she knew to seek safety for herself and her children. With little more than the clothes on their backs, they arrived in a new state, staying in a motel for a month, paying out of pocket, as their savings quickly ran out. Despite the overwhelming obstacles, Jessica refused to give up on her children. With the help of Cathedral Center's support, she found a job and took the brave step of finalizing her divorce, determined to rebuild their lives. Just a month after becoming a client, she found a home of their own—using the resources we provided to connect with reliable leasing agencies. We were honored to stand by Jessica, providing financial assistance, cleaning supplies, hygiene products, and essential household items to help her start fresh. Referrals for clothing and more household necessities also helped ease the transition for her children. Today, Jessica and her children are thriving in their new home, safe and stable for the first time in a long while. They are filled with gratitude, hope, and the peace of knowing they have a future to look forward to. We are proud to have been part of their journey and are inspired by their resilience.

Friendship House

Ellen came into our program after being in other shelters for nearly 1.5 years. She came in with increased depression, anxiety and often appeared closed and mistrustful of those around her, including staff.



The first few weeks of her being here she was still very closed off and was not very open to receiving help. Throughout several meetings with our Clinical Case Manager, Nikki, and with the support of everyone on staff, Ellen has started opening up and feeling more comfortable. She has been willing to accept referrals and support around her medical and mental health needs and has even started attending appointments for these issues. She has also appeared much happier, open and communicative with everyone. When asked about the shift in her demeanor that we've seen recently, she stated she feels "the safest I have been in a long time because I am actually feeling supported [here at Friendship House]." While she still has work to do to find employment, housing and continue to work on her mental health, she is in a much stronger position to do so because of the support she is receiving here. Thank you for allowing us to creatively provide support to Ellen who can now really work on the changes she needs to move forward.

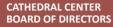

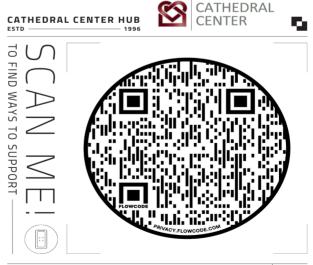
Join Our Team!
